





You're coming from abroad, flying a French or foreign flag and sailing for pleasure:

- All persons on board must go through immigration formalities with the Border Police. The documents to be presented at this checkpoint depend on your nationality and the desire length of your stay in French Polynesia.
- Any owner or captain of a pleasure boat arriving in French Polynesia from abroad by sea must report to the Papeete Port customs office in Tahiti to make an entry declaration. Your vessel may stay in French Polynesia and benefit from the temporary admission regime for a maximum of 24 consecutive months. In the event of force majeure, this period may be extended by a further 3 months.
- If a yacht or pleasure boat does not make its initial landfall at Tahiti, it may
 dock or anchor at any of the entry ports listed on the right below. Vessel
 owners or captains must then report to the island's gendarmerie
 brigade to complete the formalities for entering Polynesian territory:
 customs and immigration.





Initial landfall and clearance into French Polynesia must be completed by yachts and other pleasure craft only at one of **the following ports, bays or harbors:**

Windward Islands:

Tahiti (Papeete); Moorea (Afareaitu)

Leeward Islands:

Raiatea (Uturoa); Huahine (Fare); Bora Bora (Vaitape)

Marquesas Islands:

Nuku Hiva (Taiohae); Ua Pou (Hakahau); Hiva Oa (Atuona)

Austral Islands:

Tubai (Mataura); Rurutu (Moerai); Raivavae (Rairua)

Tuamotu-Gambier Archipelagoes:

Rangiroa (Tiputa); Mangareva (Rikitea)

A SINGLE DECLARATION FOR PLEASURE VESSELS Simplified, accessible and paperless entry and exit

A **single declaration for pleasure craft**, implemented by the Regional Customs Department of French Polynesia and the Territorial Department of the National Police, is designed to enable yachtsmen to complete their customs declarations on arrival and departure, to fulfill their declaratory obligations for entering and leaving, staying and working on the territory of French Polynesia, and to ensure the search and rescue of yachtsmen in the event of accidents and other events at sea. It is based on a legal obligation and the safeguarding of vital interests.

VHERE TO START?



FNTRY PORTS

13 entry ports in French Polynesia. Decree n°759 of July 13rd 1987 The entry formalities must be completed in Nuku Hiva, Ua Pou, Hiva Oa, Tubuai, Rurutu, Raivavae, Rangiroa, Mangareva, Moorea, Raiatea, Huahine, Bora Bora and Tahiti. Vessels must fly the yellow flag until the formalities are completed (immigration, customs, phytosanitary) and the courtesy flag.

ON YOUR ARRIVAL

You must imperatively:

- · Perform customs and immigration formalities in Tahiti or at the gendarmerie of your port of entry. Provide a list of passengers and crew, the list of restricted or prohibited goods and all passports with necessary valid visas. Online declarations for entry (see page 4) & to reserve moorings (see page 8).
- · Tahiti & Moorea Entry/Exit Authorizations: only if you are making a stopover at Tahiti or Moorea, an entry authorization must be obtained from the Capitainerie du Port Autonome in Papeete or by email (trafficmaritime@portppt.pf). as well as an exit authorization.

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(Border police / STPAF)

Formalities to be done at the office of STPAF in Faa'a (Tahiti Faa'a Airport) if you enter through Tahiti or Moorea. Otherwise, to be done at the gendarmerie of your port of entry. Note that if you make a change of crew during your stay, you must declare to the STPAF in Faa'a and update your pleasurecraft declaration - see previous page.

Each crewmember must present a valid passport and justify and a proof of health insurance coverage. French citizens may stay and work without a visa. Those coming from the E.U. (except from France) may stay without a visa under certain conditions and citizens from other countries must have a visa. This visa must imperatively carry the mention "Valid for French Polynesia".

For non-E.U passeport holders, it is mandatory to show a return ticket to your home country. The best option is to book a refundable ticket with the airline. Or use the services of a local yacht agent by which you will be exempted from this obligation...

The formalities and verification of your situation are to be done upon arrival. If you enter through the port of Papeete, go to Papeete's Customs Office. Otherwise, go to the gendarmerie of your entry port from the first official clearance island.

The Customs form, which is given to you when you arrive must be filled out and mailed to "Direction des Douanes" de Papeete within 24h. dr-polynesie@douane.finances.gouv.fr

Remember: Failure to declare one's arrival or departure is a violation of FP's Customs Code and is liable for penalties.

According to decree n° 401 CM of March 27, 2013 modified by decree n° 991 of July 9, 2020. a vessel may stay under the regime of temporary admission in Polynesian waters without clearing customs and suspended from import duties and taxes for a period of 24 consecutive months under the following conditions:

- The owner or user of the boat must not be a resident of French Polynesia nor work during his stay.
- The vessel must be registered outside of French Polynesia, it shall not be sold, rented or lent to a third party.
- Beyond the period of 24 consecutive months under temporary stay, you must leave French Polynesia waters with your boat (minimum time of 6 months is required between 2 stays in French Polynesia) If you want to base your boat more than 24 monthes, you have to «import» it with a customs procedure..

(Biosecurity authority)

To protect French Polynesia, which is free of many pests and diseases, the import of any animal, plant and any product of animal or vegetable origin is prohibited. Waivers may be granted under certain conditions by the Rural Development Service. Declaration forms are available on the website. Bringing your pet on land is prohibited. It's a crime. The import of honey is prohibited. Food products of animal and plants origin should be strictly kept onboard. Ph. 40 54 45 85

Winds: East trade winds (5-15 knots to the NE (Austral Summer) and SE (Austral Winter). Sustained trade winds (15-25 knots) in July/August.

Swells: Long S/SE swells generally small, 2-4 m during Southern depressions.

Tides: In the Society Islands, there are solar tides only, 20 cm amplitude. Every day of the year high tide is at noon and midnight, and low tide is at 6 am and 6 pm. There are moon tides for the other archipelagos 0.5 to 2 m. There can be strong current and possible tida bore in the passes in the Tuamotus Sail through during slack tides.







CLIMATE AND WEATHER FORECAST

Tropical oceanic climate Températures between 24 °C and 30 °C all year round.

November to April: "Hot season" or Austral Summer (more humid). Cool trade winds over warm ocean, cumulus and frequent showers.

May to October: "Cool season" or Austral Winter (dryer). Trade winds, few clouds and rare rainfalls.



SKIPPER'S WELCOME BRIEFING

Tourism and maritime and maritime authorities of French Polynesia, with the involvement of the tourism committees of the islands concerned, have designed welcome and information documents for international yachtsmen.

Some committees can provide you with a lively presentation, with commentary and their own recommendations. These presentations are drawn up in conjunction with the administrative departments, the Communes and the tourism committees and associations of of the more popular islands. These presentations can be viewed by request at the tourism committees office, or downloaded as pdf files (see QR code below).

They are structured along the same lines, with general information and key contacts for each port of call, as well as practical advice and recommendations, descriptions of the various authorized anchorages, their exposure and activities or points of interest in the vicinity, followed by information on the rest of the itinerary, either in the same archipelago or for the next archipelago.

A veritable compendium of practical information specific to yachting, these briefings also recall the components of a successful stay and stopover, the blunders to avoid, and the most important rules to respect, in terms of good manners and respect for the inhabitants of these islands and communes.

NAVIGATION

- No tropical depression, weather generally good, rainy season not very strong. Regular winds, influenced by the islands' mountains. Heavy swells. Inter islands navigation feasible in one day among the Northern islands and among the Southern islands.
- Open and steep coasts. Weak W/NW sea currents (1 knot), reinforced in narrow passes (ie: Bordelais channel between Hiva oa and Tahuata).
- Bays sheltered from the wind, but open to major swells. Wharfs and docks available. Muddy but stable bottoms
- Few markings: port entrance markers facing the main villages. Landing light (white fixed) on the North coast of Hiva Oa.

outhorized anchorage areas:

MOORINGS


October to February

- South coast bays: more sheltered from the wind and swells.
- **Taiohae:** stable moorings, often rolling. Restricted anchoring area: east part of the bay.
- Small wharf of Taiohae: for the dinghy (use a long line and don't tie to the ladder). Bathrooms, non drinkable water, market, handicraft, diving club, snack, yacht services...
- Schooner wharf **Quai des goélettes:** gas station.

Upon arrival in Nuku Hiva, , go and pay the water and garbage fee at the city hall in Taiohae.
1500 XPF/month



NUKU HIVA: MOORING AREA IN THE BAY OF TAIOHAE



June to September

- Hakaehu: North side, landing at the mouth of the small river.
- Anaho Bay: sandy anchorage in 12m water, max. capacity 10 yachts. White sand beach, restaurant, water, fruit and vegetables. Excursions to Hatiheu Bay, restaurant, grocery store, infirmary.
- Baie du Contrôleur: access by dinghy on the beach or by river at high tide. Village with artisans and archaeological sites, snack bar, grocery store, sports field.

MOORINGS

- Hakahau: safe mooring, sheltered by a dock, stores, infirmary, post office, bank, airport, craft and cultural center, agricultural cooperative.
- Vaiehu Bay: mooring ahead of the reefs, 7-8 m deep, pebble beach.
- Hakahetau Bay: used April to September. Landing dock to reach the village. Educational Marine Area.
- Uapo Bay: to the South, safe mooring, small recessed bay.



Landing light (fixed white light) on the N coast of the island for arrival by night.

• Tahauku Bay (or Bay of the Traitors): protected by a rocky embankment, dock for fishermen. Port equipped, service station with dock, drinkable water, car rental, boat maintenance services. Internet at the Tourism Committee Office on the dock baie anchor at the deep end of the bay. Restricted moorings area, especially during cargo ship stopovers.

Atuona (3 km away): Brel and Gauguin Center, grocery, medical center, banks, store, restaurants, post office.

• Hanaiapa Bay: very sheltered from eastern winds and swells. Wharf to access the village.

On arrival in Hiva Oa, pay the tourist tax at the Tahauku cityhall.





RANGIROA

NAVIGATION

Be careful between the atolls, visible only when less than 10 NM away. Strong currents in the channels between the atolls. In the **76 atolls**, there are **few navigable passes**. When there is strong SE winds or heavy swells, the current coming out of the passes can climb to 6 knots. A tidal bore can rise inside or outside of the passes. Enter during slack tide. Tide table on **www.shom.fr**

There are side markings in the passes of the main islands and sometimes in channels leading to villages

Be careful in the lagoons, on-sight navigation, have the sun at your back or straight above so you can see the colors and the coral heads, as well as the pearl farms buoys.

Anchoring recommended on the east side in July-August when strong E/SE winds blow.

 or toward the islets of Kiroria, Atiati

- Avatoru: wharf in deep water, marina, fuel delivery to the wharf for over 100 L, stores, medical and dental center, post office, banks, etc.
- Tiputa: wharf,small marina, stores, dumpster, post office, banks,
 5 diving clubs, dolphin's show at the sunset, water trail in the pass

Upon arrival, go and pay the garbage tax (2500 XPF/Week), and visitor's tax at Avatoru Town Hall.



- Day navigation only inside the lagoon. Make sure not to sail above or nearby the pearl farms buoys.
- Access by the Rikitea pass (23°14 S -134°53 W). Pass large and easy, can be used almost all of the time.
- Upon arrival, go to the town hall and pay for garbage and water fees. Fuel can be ordered at the town hall for over 200 l.
- Be aware that the groceries and shops in this village are replenished by cargo ship only every 3 weeks, imported food and items are therefore expensive and few.
- Reminder: never pick fruits without asking permission.

Upon arrival, go to the cityhall to pay for garbage and water taxes.



A UNIQUE EXPERIENCE

The first image coming to mind about diving in Tahiti and her islands, is the presence of 'large' fish: sharks, rays and cetaceans.

In July 2020, the journal 'Nature' published a study about reef shark populations throughout the world and ranked French Polynesia on top of the podium.

There are more than twenty shark species including the emblematic Mokorran (hammerheard shark) or the tiger shark. In addition, there are lots of manta rays in all the archipelagos and around the islands of Tahiti, on 'manta cleaning stations' or simply moving around.

GOOD HABITS:

Courtesy: inquire about diving clubs of the island or the nearby island and inform the authorities about your excursion if it is not supervised. The respect of the underwater heritage is crucial for the population and authorities of French Polynesia.

Snorkelling: no trampling nor coral collection. Be careful with underwater fauna when kicking with diving fins.



The other specificity of the Polynesian waters is the abundance of marine wildlife offshore (tuna, barracuda, kingfish...) and on the coral reefs (turtle, parrot fish, grouper, angel fish, lionfish, bass and many others...)

About fifty diving centres are active in the whole archipelagos, allowing to discover the seabed, equivalent to a territory as vast as Europe.

From the Tuamotu, globally renowned for the shark concentration in its passes, to the Australs with the most transparent waters of the planet, or the lagoon of Bora Bora and its eagle rays or lemon sharks, or Tahiti and Moorea: each island will reveal its unique underwater identity.

SWIMMING WITH THE WHALES

Each year, from July to November, dozens of humpback whales migrate inside the Polynesian waters to calve.

The Islands of Tahiti remain one of the rare areas in the world to offer such a good whale observation quality and the opportunity to plunge and snorkel in their company.



MARINE SANCTUARY FOR WHALES AND SHARKS

From 2002, French Polynesia issued a decree designating its territorial waters as the largest sanctuary for whales and marine mammals

The list of the sharks protected n the Polynesian waters was adopted in 2006 and completed in 2012: consequently, from small to arge, they are all protected in the Polynesian waters.

You can play a major role in preserving these natural areas, while strengthening the historic bonds of mutual respect between islanders and sailors.

You'll soon realize why French Polynesia is considered by many circumnavigators to be one of the most beautiful sailing destinations in the world. It's a real privilege to sail there, to meet the Polynesians and discover their traditions and culture. But it's also a duty, a heightened responsibility for yachtsmen to protect and respect them – and their ecosystems and coral reefs – just as previous generations of islanders did.

Today, these fragile islands are facing increased pressure on their lagoons, due in part to the **growing number of sailboats** on anchorages that were completely unregulated. Therefore it is not surprising that new rules and regulations for anchorages are being introduced to protect and preserve these islands and their marine environment.

When you're in port, make sure you know about and respect the regulations in force, as they are there to protect underwater ecosystems, or to give free access to schooners, liners and other boats needed to keep the local economy running smoothly. These regulations help to reduce conflicts of use within bays, infrastructures or lagoon areas between the various users of the water body. This is the case, for example, in Nuku Hiva, Hiva Oa, Tahiti, Moorea, Huahine Bora Bora and Fakaraya

WASTE MANAGEMENT

Don't leave your garbage on a sma island, especially in local residents' private garbage cans.

Their waste is often difficult enough fo small communities to manage. Don't burn your garbage on the heach

- Make sure you only dispose of your household waste on islands with landfil sites (Nuku Hiva or Ua Pou in the Marquesas Islands, and various places in the Society islands, but if possible, keep it on board during your stopovers in the Tuamotus
- Recyclable waste (cans, plastic bottles etc.) can only be processed in Tahiti, Moorea, Bora Bora and Raiatea.
- Keep your hazardous waste on board (expired fuses, oils, batteries) until you arrive in Tahiti, where you'll find dedicated collection points.

Ask at the mayor's office about garbag policy in the stopover islands.

RESPECT THE LOCAL ECOSYSTEM

- Be aware of fishing regulations before casting a line.
- www.ressources-marines.gov.pf/
- If fishing is permitted, catch only what you need to eat, not to fill your freezer!
- Anchor or moor only in authorized areas, and on sandy or muddy bottons, but never on coral.
- Use sewage tanks in coastal waters and lagoons.
- Don't scrape your hulls when anchored in bays or lagoons, to avoid introducing invasive marine species.
- Respect private property, including seaside property.
- Don't pick fruit without asking permission.

RESPECT TRADITIONS AND CULTURE


- Before arriving on a new island or archipelago, find out more about its customs, history and culture.



TAHITI ITI, THE RURAL AREA STOPPING IN THE PENINSULA

ANCHORING IN THE VICINITY

- Tautira lagoon navigable, efficient navigational aids. Anchorages at the mouth of the Aiurua river, small approachable dock to the south, access to the valley.
- Navigable lagoon from the Vaiau pass to Teahupoo. Warning: narrow artificial channel, only 2 m deep. Anchorage south of Maraetiria point (landing spot).
- Access through Havae pass (Teahupoo) to the Phaëton port (deep bay): narrow but deep, accessible under any weather. Gives access to the moorings to the south of Arahoutou point (natural small harbor), to Pataoa point, to the Vairao wharf (gas station, stores, etc.) and to the Puunui Marina (in refurbishment).

Since January 1st, 2020, anchoring is **prohibited** inside the lagoon of Bora Bora, in order to protect its underwater flora and infrastructure (cables and piping). To facilitated your stopover, they have installed 100 moorings, located in 5 large areas around the island (green zones).





Exceptional view point, the Te Mehani plateaus are home to various plants and small trees that are protected and strictly endemic to Raiatea. One is the *tiare 'apetahi*, which is the emblem of Raiatea and has been celebrated in many local legends. It is also an example of Polynesia's plants that are threatened by extinction.

Remember:

- Thank you for staying on the hiking paths, an ecological restoration is being done: we are replanting *tiare 'apetahi* for future generations as well as several endemic plants.
- Do not step on, cut or pick any plant.
- Take out your backpacks when coming close to the tiare 'apetahi, no more than 5 people around and keep a distance relative to the plant, avoid touching the plant.
- Preferably use a professional guide.

The Te mehani rahi plateau is mostly private. Please contact the Tuihana Association (87 79 37 12) or the Service Développement Rural (40 60 21 00) before any hike for your safety.

The Te mehani 'ute'ute plateau is listed as a protected area and its access is regulated and strictly submitted to athorization.

The site of Marae Taputapuātea on the island of Ra'iatea is an ancient cultural and political complex, which played a major role in the history of Polynesian civilization. Located strategically between land sea at the Mā-tahi-rā-i-te-ra'i point, it is home to many monuments, the most notable of which are the marae, open air temples and Polynesian sacred spaces: the Taputapuātea marae is the most monumental (whose large slabs carved in coral rise up to 3 meters high), the Hau-viri marae (facing the pass and on which Te Papa o Tea Rüea, the inauguration stone of the Huiari'i Tamatoa – ancient chiefs – stands in the center of the court), the 'Ōpū-teina marae, the Tau-'aitū marae and the marae-o-Hiro.

Taputapuātea was the religious and political center of the Tamatoa chiefdom of 'Ōpoa, which reigned in the 17th and 18th centuries through a network of religious and political alliances throughout eastern Polynesia, particularly through the mastery of canoe building and navigation. The spread of the cult of the god 'Oro to whom the Taputapuätea marae was dedicated, was manifested by the replication of many marae Taputapuātea in eastern



Polynesia (Windward islands, Tuamotu, Cook Islands, Australs, etc.) or the adoption of a name as a place nam (Hawaii, New Zealand).

This sacred site is also inseparable from the traditional territory of the former 'Ōpoa chiefdom, of which it was the center: the landscape is dominated by the sacred Tea-'ē-tapu mountain, forests home to many archaeological remains in the 'Ōpoa valley, the sacred Te Ava Mo'a pass, and the islet (motu) 'Ā-tara.
The cultural scenery of Taputapuātea including these marae is now on the list of UNESCO World Heritage sites





THE SEA, A RICH **BUT FRAGILE ECOSYSTEM**

ROTECT MARINE LIFE

Coral reefs are at the base of the Polynesian marine ecosystem and host a rich and diverse fauna and flora. Fragile as they are very sensitive to the quality of water, reefs are built by colonies of minuscule animals, the coral. To continue to preserve the quality of Polynesian waters and the health of coral reefs. Please be respectful.



GOOD PRACTICES

Moorings: when available, use mooring buoys, because anchoring can cause coral damage and spread invasive species. Use the available mooring areas.

Public maritime domain: using the public maritime domain: do not enter private properties to access them. Respect local prohibitions (motu and coasts).

Waste management: dumping waste in the lagoons is strictly prohibited (possible fines). Your waste must be sorted and disposed of in waste bins on land.

Snorkeling: do not step on or collect coral. Do not hit the bottom fauna with your fins.

PROTECT AND

Sharks, marine mammals, sea turtles, manta rays, shells (troca, burgau, conch, giant mussel, helmet, triton) and black coral are protected all year round. Capturing, possessing and eating these species is prohibited under penalty of fine or boat seizure.

Some species of marine animals are protected according to the area or the season (like lobsters) or are subjected to a minimum size when captured (like the "benitier" clam). Get information at each island, before catching anything.

EMBLEMATIC SPECIES

SHARKS

Some twenty species of sharks have been identified in the archipelagos. Black tips, gray or lemon sharks are common. Some passes in the Tuamotu or bays in the Marguesas attract remarkable shark concentrations at the world scale.

TURTLES

5 species of sea turtles live in Polynesian waters. The green turtle and the "imbriquée" turtles can be seen in the lagoons or behind the reef. Green turtles regularly lay their eggs in Polynesia.


CETACEANS

16 species come regularly to Polynesia. The bottlenose dolphin, is often seen in bays and passes. Humpback whales are the most common. They are normally present from July to December when they reproduce. In French Polynesia, these species are followed by scientists and often observed by the public.







FORMALITIES

Immigration formalities upon exit:

If you are leaving French Polynesia via Tahiti or Moorea, register your departure with the Papeete port yachting Service (contact details on page 1).

Customs formalities upon exit:

You can come to the customs office 24 hours before departure. If you're leaving on a Monday, remember to come on Friday. If your next destination requires an exit clearance form, please go to the Autonomous Port of Motu Uta to obtain one (trafficmaritime@portppt.pf). This document will enable you to benefit from tax-free diesel fuel.

Make sure you have completed all the formalities on the the formalities on your online custom and immigration declaration form (see p. 4).

Entry and exit conditions for foreigners in French Polynesia are the responsibility of the Service Territorial de la Police aux Frontières (STPAF). If you are not a citizen of the European Union, please contact the Border Police.

TAX-FREE FUEL

- The Papeete Customs Office (only) can give you an authorization of tax-free fuel. This authorization is valid 6 months.
- If you have a maritime agent, he can get this authorization for you as soon as you arrive in the Marque-

IMPORTATION OF EQUIPMENT AND SPARE PART

The suspension of duties and taxes is granted to the boat under the Boat Temporary Admission. The previous dispositions also apply to spare parts, equipment and parts used in operations of repair of a vessel under temporary admission.

Spare parts, equipments and parts covered in the previous paragraph must be declared to Customs under temporary admission (DAUP unguaranteed model) and are declared to codification 99.08.00.00

Non residents do not entitled to the postage free alowance. They will therefore have to fill a customs declaration for their temporary import, regardless of its amount.

To benefit from it on imported equipment, the replaced equipment must be either destroyed (destruction certificate required) or exported (exit customs declaration) or released for consumption (by paying the appropriate taxes). If the imported equipment is not a replacement or a repair, it will be released for consumption and does not benefit from duties and taxes exemptions.

As a derogation to the dispositions of the precedent paragraph, the suspension benefit is also granted:

- either for general interest reasons,
- or when the parts and equipment are included in the entry declaration and are subject of a later delivery.

Depending of the value of the requested equipment, you are advised to go through the services of a freight-forwarder or buy from local merchants. Feel free to request quotes or inquire locally before ordering from outside of French Polvnesia.

Moreover, if your purchase (equipment or fueling equipment) is concomitant of departure and that the merchant agrees to grant you the regime of final exportation (DAUP Modele E100), you will benefit from a tax refund on VAT. If you pay the tax, no exit formality is required.
